mother of three children.

These tragic people had been caught in the trap of the war they could scarecely understand. Political ideology is meaningless to the masses who only hope to see another sunrise. Should we put fictional barriers against them when we look into the hollow eyes and gaunt faces of these people?

The Korean Atomic Bomb Sufferers Relief Association of Japan was founded three years ago based on a non-political basis by a group of citizens who believe that to relieve these Korean A-bomb sufferers is the duty of Japanese, and of all human beings who stand firmly against the existence of the nuclear weapons on our beautiful earth. We, the members of the Association, have gradually enlarged the circle of the activities by our continuous man-to-man appeal to the neighbor citizens. The donations from the members of the Association and those who approve our motives have been helping the Korean atomic bomb sufferers to unite themselves and to voice their sufferings to the But our effort is still too small and far away from the goal to give all the Korean sufferers medical care and food, and to right the wrongs in the past and provide a new future for these helpless people.

Under the circumstances, the Korean A-bomb Casualty Associations is planning to establish an A-bomb sufferers' self-support village in the suburbs of Seoul, where some of them live together and help each other to make their own livings by some means.

At this stage, we have decided to send this appeal to people all over the world in the hope that more people come to know the existence of the miserable Korean A-bomb sufferers and to render their helps to them so that they can live longer and peacefully.

Can you just turn a deaf ear to the suffering voices? Can you let them die without any hope after nearly 30 years of long and lonesome sufferings?

Tomorrow will be too late for some of these Korean sufferers! Please write them today, donate for them, and show them that they are not forgotten people.

Please think it over that today the A-bomb sufferings are of these people, but tomorrow may be yours, ours, and of your and our loving ones, unless we all human beings resolutely ban the nuclear weapons on our mother earth.
