Ohira Calls for Law to Help N-Victims Here

TOKYO (UPI) — Foreign Minister Masayoshi Ohira believes that Japan should enact special legislation to help Koreans and other foreigners suffering from the so-called "atomic bombing disease."

More than 200,000 Japanese people were reported killed when the world's first A-bomb was dropped over Hiroshima on Aug. 6, 1945, and another 50,000 persons died when the second A-bomb exploded over Nagasaki two days later.

The Asashi Shimbun newspapers said that Ohira met with Yoshihiro Motoyoshi, leader of a Japanese group calling for the aid of Korean victims of the atomic bombing, in the foreign minister's constituency on Shikoku Sunday and told him that "There is a need for the government to enact special legislation to help not only Korean sufferers but also other foreigners as well."

Japan Likely to Aid ROK-Bomb Victim

TOKYO (Hapdong) — Korean victims of the atomic bombs exploded in Japan in 1945 are likely to receive relief aid from the Japanese government.

Officials of the committee for the relief of the Korean atomic bomb victims said they recently sent a letter through Foreign Minister Masayoshi Ohira asking Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka for aid to the wounded.

Ohira who received the letter in a reception held for him at his constituency of Kanagawa Prefecture said he felt a need for legislation that would provide aid for the Koreans and other foreigners who were wounded in the atomic bomb blasts in the final days of World War II.

Koreans account for 10 per cent of all those who were wounded by the atom bombs.
